

# How to spot an opioid overdose and use naloxone to help save a life

Naloxone (brand name Narcan) is a medicine that can quickly reverse an opioid overdose. It is small and easy to use and carry.

Having naloxone on hand is like carrying an epinephrine auto-injector (like an EpiPen) for someone with severe allergies. It gives extra protection for those at a higher risk for opioid overdose.

If you think someone is having an opioid overdose but aren't sure, giving them naloxone won't hurt them — and it could help save their life.<sup>1</sup>

# WHERE TO BUY NALOXONE

You can buy naloxone over the counter without a prescription. You can also get it from community distributions and harm-reduction groups. You can also ask your health plan about coverage for a prescription.

### HOW TO HELP PREVENT AN OVERDOSE

- Only take opioids as prescribed.
- Store opioids in a safe place others can't get into.
- Safely get rid of unused prescription opioids. The FDA provides guidelines on their drug disposal page (www.fda.gov/drugs/safe-disposal-medicines/ disposal-unused-medicines-what-you-should-know).
- ▶ Have non-expired naloxone nearby if needed.

#### SIGNS OF AN OPIOID OVERDOSE

- Person does not wake or respond to touch or voice.
- Breathing is not normal, is very slow or has stopped.
- Pupils are very small, like pinpoints.
- Lips and nose are blue, gray or pale.

## WHAT TO DO IF YOU THINK SOMEONE IS HAVING AN OVERDOSE

- 🚺 Call 911.
- Give naloxone to the person.
  - Read and follow the instructions for the naloxone you have.

- 3 Try to keep the person awake and breathing.
- Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- 5 Stay with the person until emergency help arrives.
