

Safely get rid of unused drugs to help protect yourself and your loved ones

Keeping unused, unwanted or expired drugs can be risky. About half of people who misuse prescription pain meds get them from a friend or relative.¹ And almost 50% of people in the U.S. have used at least one prescription drug in the past 30 days.² Misuse of these drugs can lead to poisoning, overdose and even death. It's important to safely get rid of unused prescription drugs to lower this risk.

LEARN HOW TO SAFELY GET RID OF UNUSED MEDS

- 1 Go to a year-round drug take back site right away.** This is the best way to get rid of your unused medicine. Find a take back location near you through the FDA's drug take back location page: [fda.gov/drugs/disposal-unused-medicines-what-you-should-know/drug-disposal-drug-take-back-locations](https://www.fda.gov/drugs/disposal-unused-medicines-what-you-should-know/drug-disposal-drug-take-back-locations)
- 2 Participate in a National Drug Take Back Day.** The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) hosts these days twice a year across the country. These days are a good time to clean out your medicine cabinet and drop off your unused drugs at a take back site. Check out an event near you: [dea.gov/takebackday](https://www.dea.gov/takebackday)
- 3 Reach out to local police.** Many police agencies have drug collection units available for free.
